At the meeting, we also finalised the latest content and format-related details of our learning programme and prepared ourselves for the upcoming testing phase.

The piloting of our learning programme

After months of fine-tuning, we are thrilled to start the piloting process of our learning programme, scheduled to take place between December 2024 and February 2025.

This online course is designed for everyone who works or wishes to work in the health or social sector and wants to know how to creatively address societal challenges.

Comprising five learning units, the programme takes approximately 5 hours and covers:

- Which trends influence the delivery of welfare services and which challenges different target groups experience.
- What social innovations are and how learning and innovations labs can help find new solutions to 'wicked problems'.
- How to set up and run a lab, step-by-step, according to the LINK learning and innovation lab model and with practical examples from the LINK labs.

- How to understand complex societal problems and find creative solutions to them, work with multidisciplinary teams, and involve stakeholders and users.
- How to evaluate and effectively disseminate impact and mainstream successful innovations.

The Serbian lab

The Serbian team addresses the lack of support services for Roma families with children aged 0-6 in the field of parenting and early development. Through a multidisciplinary network, including the education, social, and health care sectors, our lab strives to ensure support services are not only available but adapted to the needs and contexts of the Roma community.

So far, through our activities, we have supported seven children in enrolling in kindergarten and 59 children in obtaining their vaccinations and pediatric examinations. We have also developed an action plan for the promotion among Roma families of the importance of early childhood development. This includes engaging with a Roma mother who is quite active on social media and can therefore, through her posts, support us in raising awareness about the importance of preschool education, vaccination, and regular medical check-ups.



The Swedish lab

[Community power to reduce involuntary loneliness for elderly people](#)

The Swedish team has developed an initiative focused on reducing involuntary loneliness among older people and challenging the current structural conditions for performing voluntary work. Through collaboration with public officials, the voluntary sector, churches, property owners, and libraries, our lab aims to create solutions that strengthen community ties and social networks, this way making it easier for older people to participate in activities and build new connections.

At present, we are planning a joint Senior Day to showcase all identified activities, regardless of which organisation is hosting them. We are also working on developing a coordinated activity calendar offering both an overview of available activities and the opportunity for volunteers to sign up and contribute. We believe this will simplify participation, encourage engagement, and foster meaningful interactions.
